The Salem Historical Society promotes scholarship and public history to explore and share Salem's rich history with the world.

REVOLUTION 250 AND SALEM

In 2026 the nation will commemorate the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution. Revolution250 <u>https://revolution250.org/</u> is a consortium of organizations working together to commemorate the 250th with events leading up to and through the American Revolution in Massachusetts.



While Boston, Lexington and Concord receive much of the attention regarding revolutionary Massachusetts, Salem figured prominently both before Paul Revere's Ride in April 1775 and after the British evacuation of Boston in March 1776.

SHS is working with other Salem organizations and Revolution250 to research, educate and commemorate revolutionary Salem. Did you know that when General Gage closed the Port of Boston in May 1774, he moved Customs to the Port of Salem, followed closely by his own encampment in Salem. And in the fall of 1774 the First Provincial Congress of Massachusetts met in Salem. Once the war started Salem men and women of all races provided support and served in militia, commonwealth and continental army and navy units. Most importantly

Salem's privateers relentlessly attacked the British Navy and commercial shipping throughout the war.

Since 2017 the Salem Historical Society has collaborated with the Leslie's Retreat Committee to commemorate the February 26, 1775 unsuccessful attempt by British troops to find and confiscate patriot cannons hidden in Salem. The 2020 re-enactment featured a rousing sermon by Reverend Barnard followed by the confrontation with Colonel Leslie and his British soldiers. First Church provided a lovely collation after the event and the Witch House provided programing regarding women and the revolution. SHS congratulates the Leslie's Retreat Committee on its fourth successful event. **Mark your calendars for February 21, 2021 for the next Leslie's Retreat re-enactment.**



PAST EVENTS EXHIBIT - OUT TO SEA: THE SALEM

Last August 22, 2019 on a very hot summer night the Salem Historical Society held its opening reception for our first exhibit, Out to Sea: The Salem Harbor Islands presented in partnership with The Salem Museum at Salem's historic Old Town Hall. The exhibit complimented the museums regular displays by focusing on Salem's history but choosing a subject that many people are unfamiliar with, the harbor islands of Salem. Bakers, Children's and Misery Islands have been a part of the Salem community for centuries but today remain as elusive to the citizens of Salem as ever. Originally utilized by the Naumkeag people the islands have a long and storied history. Captured in six detailed panels the exhibit covered topics ranging from the islands Early History, Ma and Pa Lighthouses of Bakers Island, Pleasure and Tourism

on Lowell Island, Health and Healing on Children's Island as well as panels on Flora and Fauna and the Natural History of the islands looking toward the future and the danger climate change will have on the local coast and islands.

Enjoying light refreshments among the Museums displays, Society's Trustees were joined by many SHS members as well as board presidents and members from other local organizations such as the The House of the Seven Gables, Essex National Heritage Area, the Colonial Society of Massachusetts and many other guests. ACTIVITY FROM THE SHS MAILBAG

QUERIES & RESEARCH by Irene Axelrod

The Salem Historical Society receives approximately 20-30 inquiries via our email account <u>salemhistoricalsociety@gmail.com</u> each month from members, local residents, and people interested in Salem from across the globe. While questions asking about various aspects of the Witch Trials are often represented, we receive many requests asking about geneaology. Folks want to know where an ancestor lived, was buried or how to obtain birth, marraige and death certificates of their ancestors. We often refer these requests to the geneaology organizations listed on our Resources page so individuals and families can follow up themselves. Some requests require detailed research and for that SHS charges a small hourly fee.* Many of the inquiries we receive can be compelling and allow all of us an opportunity to broaden our knowledge of Salem's history and people.

While we receive questions on a wide range of topics such as information about Roger Conant from his 10 times great-grandson researcing a school paper, or information as to where Charles Lenox Remond lived, and where is the burial location of Captain John Derby of the vessel *Quero* who famously sailed across the Atlantic carrying news of Lexington and Concord arriving before the British ships ensuring that the Americans version of events was received first.

Recently, we received a question regarding a supposed dancing school conducted by a William Turner in the early 19th century. We were able to find the dance instructor, Mr. Turner, his school and its location in Salem. We also discovered that one of Turner's pupils was Nathaniel Hawthorne! Young Nathaniel wrote his mother in Maine when he was fourteen, "I think I had rather go to dancing school a little longer before I come to Raymond." Turner retired a few years later in 1820 after nearly forty years of teaching dance. In the Salem Gazette of October 24, 1820 he wrote that his season ending ball, was "the closing scene of my professional life."


The Salem Historical Society (SHS) frequently serves as a connecting point between donors and possible depositories for historic material. A great example of this involves three Civil War diaries sent to us by a donor in Groton, MA. The diaries were written by John P. Reynolds (1840-1919), documenting his time serving with the Salem Light Infantry, also known as the Salem Zouaves, and later with the 19th MA Infantry, where he was promoted to Captain.

Although a handful of other Reynolds' diaries are available at both the Massachusetts Historical Society and the Clements Library at the University of Michigan, none of his papers were held by a local Salem institution. It seemed fitting that the material stay in Salem, as Reynolds lived here all his life and served in the Salem Zouaves. The Society was able to put the donor in touch with Salem <u>State University's Archives</u> <u>and Special Collections</u> department, where the papers are now housed and available to all.

*Questions come from folks who have family roots or specific research interests in Salem. Many of our Trustees are trained historians and archivists. Often we receive request for further detailed and in-depth research questions that require access to the many local libraries and archives. For these inquires SHS charges a small hourly fee of \$25.00, however, this year **members get a 50% discount**. Once our resident researcher, Irene Axelrod, former librarian for the Phillips Library, has assessed the length of time involved in the research she will contact you ahead of time. WALKING TOURS

As we continue to add more content to the website, we are currently creating videos of some of our popular walking tours. Originally created by SHS for the Essex National Heritage Area we are working on visual strolls through the streets of Salem. Focusing on Salem's Maritime Neighborhood, this tour explores Salem during the Golden Age of Sail, showcaseing Salem's heyday when ships sailed around the world. A second tour also originally created for ENHA focused on the neighborhood where Nathaniel Hawthorne, grew up. This tour will take us to the areas where Hawthorne lived and wrote about in his famous novels. Trustee, Beth Bower created a tour for the Bridge Street Neck Association and a video of the walk is planned. Members look for emails over the summer notifying you of when these tours will be available on our website.
